With Tears of Sorrow

Last Farewell Services to a Beloved One- Good Bye

While the sunny rays decending from a seren sky gave evidence of life and vitality to all earthly surroundings the atmosphere at the late home of Mrs. Gramlich , deceased was moistened by the tears of sorrow and bereavement.

## **PEACEFULLY PASSED AWAY.**

**Mrs. Julia Gramlich Died Monday at Her Home at an Advanced Age—An Old Resident.**

Mrs. Julia Gramlich died Monday at her home in this city after several months' illness. She was taken sick last winter with the grip and, owing to her advanced age, has never been able to recover from it.

Mrs. Julia Gramlich, whose maiden name was Folt, was born in Yachthausen, Wuremberg, Germany, on June 22, 1819. In May, 1837, she was married to John F. Gramlich, who died about two years ago. In 1838 they came to this county and landed in Baltimore. They came from there to Ohio by wagon and settled in Hardin county and resided here ever since. Five children are left to mourn her death, Mrs. Jacob D. Bateson, Mrs. Jacob Ault, of Oessa Tp., and Mrs. W. O. Ries, H. W. Gramlich and W. B. Gramlich, of this city. Mrs. Gramlich was a devout Christian, a life long member of the M. M. church and a woman universally loved and respected by all who know her.

The funeral services were held at the house Wednesday at 2 p. m., Rev. J. H. Fitzwater officiating.
